DRPLS Receives Superior Award!

The DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) was honored with the Superior Award by the Historical Society of Michigan at the Society's 2006 Upper Peninsula History Conference in Escanaba, June 24th. Chuck and Jeri-Baron Feltner accepted the award on behalf of the dedicated volunteers of the DRLPS.

The Superior Award was established in 2006 to honor historical societies, museums, and other historical organizations in the UP for their efforts to preserve and promote Upper Peninsula history. Territorial governor Lewis Cass and Henry Schoolcraft, who explored and wrote about the UP, founded the Society in 1828.

"The (DeTour Reef Light) Preservation Society's remarkable efforts in only eight years exemplify the dedication and community spirit for which the Upper Peninsula is renowned," commented HSM Awards committee chairman Robert Myers of Berrien Springs.

Chuck Feltner, DRLPS Restoration Chairman and past-President, stated: "Jeri and I were honored to accept the

prestigious Superior Award on behalf of all the dedicated hard-working volunteers of the DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society team. DRLPS has come a long way from the first organizational meeting on January 8, 1998, and accomplished much to be proud of,

but we must keep our eyes on the mission and stay on course for the preservation of the DeTour Reef Light for generations to enjoy."

Several historical and educational projects have currently been completed, including a traveling historical display of historic lighthouse photographs and engineering drawings, oral history vid-

eos of past lighthouse keepers, production of lighthouse existing conditions video, production of a video of DeTour Reef Light history and restoration, obtaining of copies of the original lighthouse keepers' logbooks from the National Archives along with over 1,000 pages of official correspondence, and creation of digital copies of all historical material onto DVDs.

Planned work in the future includes rebuilding the second deck crane,

Superior Award continued from page 1 . . . construction of a tour boat landing dock and access stairway to better facilitate public tours of the lighthouse, creating interpretive signs, and development of an onshore visitor's center.

The DRLPS nomination was submitted to recognize the outstanding contributions that the local grass-roots volunteers of the DRLPS have made over the past nine years, for their unfailing dedication and determination to restore, preserve and promote the DeTour Reef Light, to acknowledge the key role they have played in enhancing public awareness, education, and understanding of the history of the Light, and for advancing appreciation for the Eastern Upper Peninsula's maritime history.

Built in 1931, and standing a mile offshore in northern Lake Huron at the far eastern end of Michigan's Upper Peninsula, the DeTour Reef Light rises gallantly 83

feet above the water. The structure, sitting on a unique 60-foot square, 20-foot high concrete crib, is a steel-framed square tower of three distinct levels in Classical-



Revival architectural style. It marks a dangerous reef to help guide ship traffic from and to Lake Huron and Lake Superior via the strategic St. Mary's River. The Light was automated in 1974. In

1997, the lighthouse was declared surplus property by the U. S. Coast Guard due to sophisticated navigational systems aboard ships, and the Coast Guard's not having the funding to care for the structure in accordance with historic preservation guidelines.

In 1998, local citizens formed the DRLPS as a nonprofit 501(c) (3) organization to restore and preserve the lighthouse. The DRLPS completed major interior and exterior restoration on the lighthouse in 2004. Public tours and overnight keeper programs to this historic Light began in July, 2005.

A Note from the President . . .

The word is out about the terrific lighthouse keeper program and tours at DeTour Reef Light. This year DRLPS hosted 37 volunteer lighthouse keepers and 74 tour guests over a nine-week period.

The Society purchased a new refrigerator for the lighthouse in response to keeper requests and also took action to exterminate the spiders that took up residence in the lighthouse.

The period porcelain top cabinets donated by the Chisholms and the McClures match the original furnishing for the kitchen, as does the metal bed donated by Jim Charles for the keeper's room. These items, which were hauled out this May with the help of our local high school students, have added a true warmth and

historic authenticity to the furnishings of DeTour Reef Light.

The exceptional value of our Public Tour program has not been widely recognized and we often have open tour spaces available. Unfortunately, at \$95 for non-members and \$75 for members, many people are



discouraged by the cost and do not take the time to understand all that we provide. The ride itself on the St. Mary's River and out to the lighthouse and back is worth the price! Added to that is a two-hour private tour (tours are limited to six people at a time) of all spaces of an active restored lighthouse with resident keepers and the inclusion of light refreshments. Many lighthouse "tours" are only of the exterior or keeper's residence and exclude the lighthouse tower. DRLPS offers much more.

John and Mary Forslund sent us the following note after taking the tour:

"What a delightful adventure our tour of 'The Light' was on Saturday. It certainly exceeded our expectations. We were so impressed with the organization and the thoroughness of the Board. A big thank you to you and the whole crew who work so hard to 'keep the light on.'"

In addition to their tour payment, John and Mary included \$150 gift to the Society to assist with the cost of offering tours. Everyone who has taken the tour appreciates the value received. It should be noted that the full cost of the tour program exceeds tour revenue and that hundreds of hours of volunteer time are devoted to support our public tour offerings.

Live TV Broadcasts from the Light!

On June 1, the *9&10 Michigan This Morning* broadcasted live from the DeTour Reef Light (DRL). The broadcast gave the DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society's (DRLPS) motto, "We'll Keep the Light on for You", a brand new meaning.

Putting a video cam on the DeTour Reef Light was first proposed by Chuck Feltner, Treasurer and Director for the DRLPS. However, because of all the restoration activities over the last three years, the proposal had to stay on a wish list of unique uses for this proud and beautiful Light.

Recently, Dave Bardsley, Director and President of the DRLPS, encouraged Chuck to see if there was an opportunity to place a TV camera on the Light. Chuck shared his vision with Corey Adkins, Director of Photojournalism at Channel 9&10.

On May 24, Chuck took 9&10 News Chief Engineer, Lowell Shore, to the Light for an inspection to determine the feasibility of putting the video camera on DRL. The result was a definite "YES"! With 9&10 News' antennas, it was possible to relay signals from the Light to a tower just south of Mackinaw City and then to the studios of 9&10 in Cadillac.

The next week Corey and reporter Ted Haller came back and set up their equipment. On June 1st, 9&10 Michigan This Morning included live segments from the DeTour Reef Light. The crew was able to show many of the areas inside the light including the Keepers' Quarters, the gallery level overlooking the machinery area below, and the light tower. It was a unique way to showcase the success of the DRLPS. The camera shots showed the results of the effort and the vision of a hard working and dedicated group.


Because of the successful broadcast, Channel 9&10 mounted a Weather CAM on the northeast corner of DRL and during much of July and August their weather segments included live shots from the Light with views of Lake Huron, the St. Mary's River, Drummond Island, and DeTour Village.

In Chuck's words, "It's a good start." His vision is to have the views available 24 by 7 using links from the DRLPS website (www.DRLPS.com). He hopes that a video camera could be used for freighter and fisherman watching and possibly some husband watching by their wives at home.



Still Available — Limited Edition Etching on Original Glass from DeTour Reef Light

Thirty one glass panes salvaged during the restoration of DeTour Reef Light have been etched with an image of the restored DeTour Reef Light. While individually etched with a sequence number, each pane is unique, as during cleaning and etching of the glass attention was made not to remove paint along the edges or the weathered and aged patina of the glass. The etching is on the non-weathered side of the glass. The panes are approximately 9 ¼ x 11 inches and ¼ inch thick.

Harbor View Framing of DeTour Village has designed a custom framing package that surface mounts the glass in an attractive and protective frame. This allows

the impressively thick edge of the glass to be visible as well as the patina of old paint and weathering. In the photo, the glass is placed over a black background, but Harbor View can use any color (such as blue, red, brown, etc) that will contrast with the etching.



Imagine that the glass pane is lying on a piece of black material. Then black represents clear glass in the above and white indicates engraved areas.

DRLPS is making this limited number of glass panes available at a price of \$300.00. Custom Framing by Harbor View in your choice of background color is available at \$150. DRLPS can ship directly to the purchaser or to Harbor View. Pricing excludes tax and shipping (\$15 for glass, TBD for framed glass). Each pane will be shipped with a certificate of authenticity and a significant portion of the cost can be tax deductible. At this printing 9 of the 31 panes have been sold.



2006 DRLPS Ornament


