Boat Donation Sought



One of the many difficult tasks in maintaining and operating public programs on an offshore lighthouse is transportation to and from the Light. The DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) had for many years benefited from the support of Ivan Gable (Sturgeon Bay Charters) in transporting maintenance crews, volunteer lighthouse keepers and tourists between Fort Drummond Marine and the DeTour Reef Light. Last year Captain Gable decided to retire from this part of his business.

DRLPS has been unsuccessful in finding a replacement operation. Accordingly, the Light Preservation Society is seeking an appropriate boat to operate between to and from the Light – a distance of 3 miles. The boat must be capable of accommodating six passengers, their "stuff" (baggage and food for a weekend), and two crew. An enclosed boat about 23 feet in length would work well. Tour Program: One trip on most Saturdays at noon June 18th to Sept 3rd. Tour length is 2 hours. Maintenance: 4-6 trips per year on an irregular basis.

The DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society Shining Bright Celebrating 25 years (1998-2023) By Jeri Baron Feltner

The DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) is celebrating 25 years of "Keeping The Light On For You!" thanks to the dedicated, talented volunteers, members and organizations along the way who have restored, preserved, and shared the historic lighthouse for all to enjoy.

THE LIGHTHOUSE

Built in 1931, the offshore DeTour Reef Light Station proudly stands guard at the entrance to the St. Marys River in northern Lake Huron at the eastern end of Michigan's Upper Peninsula between the communities of De-Tour Village and Drummond Island. The Light guides ship traffic from and to Lake Huron and Lake Superior and beams as an icon to the rich maritime history of the area. The Light was automated in 1974. Due to sophisticated navigational equipment aboard modern ships, and the massive conversion to unmanned automated beacons, along with insufficient operating funds, the U.S. Coast Guard rendered many Great Lakes lighthouses obsolete in 1997. The DeTour Reef Light Station was included in the list. Government regulations allowed nonprofit organizations to obtain ownership of lighthouses for the purpose of preservation and education.

THE SOCIETY

With the mission of saving the Lighthouse, a small group of citizens from DeTour Village and Drummond Island met on January 4, 1998, and the DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) was established as an all-volunteer nonprofit 501c3 organization, and dedicated to the restoration and preservation of the Lighthouse and the sharing of its history for generations to enjoy.

Nationwide attention was received when the National Trust for Historic Preservation named Michigan's historic lighthouses, with DeTour Reef Light being their prime example, to their 1998 *List of America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places*.

With government grants, and public and private donations, DRLPS significantly re-

stored the Lighthouse in 2004. In 2005, guided public tours, and overnight keeper programs were established to this magnificent monument to Michigan's maritime history. The DRLPS has earned many awards for restoration and preservation of this significant historic structure and regional icon, including the State of Michigan Governor's Award for Historic Preservation in 2005, the Superior Award from the Historical Society of Michigan in 2006, and the DRLPS was designated a Preserve America Steward by the Federal Government in 2010. The DeTour Reef Light Station is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Under the National Historic Lighthouse Preservation Act, the Federal government transferred ownership of the DeTour Reef Light Station to the DRLPS in June 2010. A Michigan Historical Marker honoring the Lighthouse was erected on M-134 near DeTour Village in 2013.

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RESTORATION AND PRESERVATION OF THE LIGHTHOUSE

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It takes a lot of support and money to restore and maintain a lighthouse, particularly an offshore one! Since the establishment of the DRLPS in 1998, restoration and preservation of the historic DeTour Reef Light, along with developing and executing educational programs, has required major funding to keep the Light on and available to the public. Since 1998, the DRLPS team has worked hard to obtain 15 grants from government and private organizations totaling over \$1.5 million. These grants, coupled with generous donations from DRLPS members and the public for matching grant funds, have enabled DRLPS to restore the Light and keep it shining for the public's enjoyment.

The DRLPS is very grateful for the support of the public, their members, the Lighthouse keepers, and the participants in fundraisers, which has enabled DRLPS to raise funds to obtain the matching funds required for the Federal and State grants. DRLPS is also very appreciative of the State Historic Preservation Office Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program (whose grant funds come from the public purchase of lighthouse license plates – *see <u>www.michigan.gov/sos/vehicle/license-plates/collector-plate-options</u>). Also, State, Federal and private grant agencies have continued their support with grant funds to preserve the Lighthouse and educate the public on its history.*

A dedicated and determined all-volunteer group manages DRLPS and works diligently on ongoing fundraisers, restoration, maintenance, and operation of the Lighthouse programs.

2023 New Old Power System By Brad McGann

Here's a challenge: You live on a small island and someone has cut the power to your house, but you have guests coming to visit in just a few weeks. Yikes! After a few sleep-less nights, the volunteer engineer realized "hey, this is just like living off the grid boon-docking in my camper every winter in Arizona!" So, we're off to the races.

Go study the camper and see what can be replicated at DeTour Reef Light, keeping in mind that the De-Tour Reef Light is a miniature island in Lake Huron. OK, water heaters in all campers operate on propane. Not a problem; replace the existing electric water heater at the Light with a propane one, and install a pair of redundant propane tanks up on the deck just like the camper has. CHECK!

Look at the lighting system in the camper—hmm, all LED bulbs. Well, that's certainly not a problem, everyone is moving to LED bulbs because they use 90% less electricilonger) than incandescent bulbs. They can be purchased just about anywhere and replacement is as easy as just unscrewing the old bulbs. CHECK!

Power. OK, a little more involved. Most campers only have a 12 Volt DC battery operated power system, and that

sure won't power our household refrigerator and microwave at the light, not to mention the water pump. But many newer campers have inverters, nifty electronic boxes that take battery voltage and convert it into 120 Volts AC just like it comes out of the wall at home. Great, now we just need some batteries and an inverter—not a problem, we just need to carry about **600 pounds of lead batteries** out and up the light—CHECK!

Just one minor(?) detail, we have to charge the batteries. Some inverters have built in battery chargers, but where is the electricity coming from? In our origi-

nal proposal the electricity was to come from a large diesel generator with a big fuel tank and several solar panels to help reduce fuel consumption. But the original proposal didn't pan out for 2023, and remember all those guests soon to be knocking at the door?



We need a generator on wheels that we just plug in to that inverter, then plug the inverter into the existing electrical system at the light, and a few gas cans later we have our power back for Summer 2023. CHECK!

Well at least it all works in the camper, and the keeper quarters at the light are a bit like a big camper. All we need to do is quickly round up the equipment and float it out to the light, plumb and wire it all in, and do some testing—before the first guest keepers come to visit in June. But right now, if all goes according to plan, by June the only difference keepers who have been to the light previously will notice is that the foghorn will not work (WAY too much power required), and there will be a generator running outside for up to 4 hours or so every day—and they will be responsible for fueling the generator. The kitchen fridge will still work, the microwave, a hot plate, and the lights. All the comforts of home—including hot and cold potable water.

But remember we're now camping, and everyone who has been out in a camper boondocking (without hookups) knows that water and power are precious and used conservatively. There is plenty of water in the lake, but the power to pump it and sterilize it depends on power conservation. At this point we can't say just how conservative the keepers will need to be. However, the important thing is that keepers will return to DeTour Reef Light in the summer of 2023. Welcome home!




DeTour Reef Light 2 DVD Video Available



Sometimes We Win and Sometimes We Don't

The DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) has been fortunate in receiving grant assistance in the past for restoration of the Light. Last fall, we applied for another Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program (MLAP) grant to repower DeTour Reef Light (DRL) following failure of the underwater cable that has powered the Light since the late 1930s. Over the summer of 2022 we investigated methods and the cost to repair or replace the cable. Repair on the very old cable was determined to be unadvisable and replacement approached a million dollars.

The DRLPS board voted in the fall to repower DRL in a manner close to the original 1931 configuration of diesel generator and a large bat-



tery bank. Although not consistent with 1931 technology, a supplemental solar panel charging system could be added to reduce the need for large quantities of diesel fuel to be hauled to the Light each week. A system was designed by board member Brad McGann that was close to the original 1931 plan. Cost estimates assuming professional installation were about \$100,000. The costs for the supplemental solar panel charging array were excluded from this estimate as it was not historically accurate and not allowable under the MLAP grant rules. (Note, MLAP grants are capped at \$60,000 and require a match of at least 1/3 of the total project cost).

The MLAP program is funded by purchase of 'Save Our Lights' license plates and DRLPS was one of many applicants. Awards this year were for two projects that are more visibly restoration and protection:

Rock of Ages Lighthouse, Rock of Ages Lighthouse Preservation Society (\$46,000, match: \$23,000). Hire a contractor to rehabilitate the 132-foot-tall lighthouse by cleaning and painting the tower exterior. Situated on a tiny island of rock two miles off the coast of Isle Royale, Rock of Ages Lighthouse was last painted in 1985. This project will prevent future water intrusion and allow interior restoration efforts to continue.

Eagle Harbor Light Station, Keweenaw County Historical Society (\$60,000, match: \$39,000). Hire a contractor to rehabilitate the lighthouse tower. Proposed work will include replacement of deteriorated brick and selective repointing of the tower, repairing damaged plaster on the tower interior, roof and wall water diversion, and deck and lantern room repair.

While not receiving a grant, DRLPS is proceeding with a smaller program to provide minimal power to the Light with a gasoline generator and four large batteries. This program will provide lighting, power for a micro-wave and refrigeration, and water pressure. Potable water and a propane hot water heater are in the plan but not guaranteed. Until a more robust power system can be provided, we are offering a "rustic" lighthouse keeper program that asks keepers to bring drinking water and possibly take cold showers (should they choose).



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

DeTour Reef Lighthouse Preservation Society

DRLPS is a volunteer nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization established in 1998 to restore and preserve the DeTour Reef Light. Donations are welcomed and are tax-deductible (EIN 38-3387252, MICS 27001).

The Light was automated in 1974. In 1997, the lighthouse was declared surplus property by the U. S. Coast Guard due to sophisticated navigational systems aboard ships, and the Coast Guard's not having the funding to care for the structure in accordance with historic preservation guidelines. In January 1998, local citizens joined together to save the Light.

The lighthouse was built in 1931, and proudly stands guard a mile offshore in northern Lake Huron at the far eastern end of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The structure rises 83 feet above the water and marks a dangerous reef to help guide ship traffic from and to Lake Huron and Lake Superior via the strategic St. Mary's River.

The DRLPS received the 2005 Governor's Award for excellence in historic preservation, and the Superior Award in 2006 from the Historical Society of Michigan. The DeTour Reef Light is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In 2010 the DRLPS was designated a Preserve America Steward by First Lady Michelle Obama.

PURPOSE: The purpose of DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society is to establish, support and promote efforts in the preservation and restoration of the DeTour Reef Light; to achieve the safe keeping of the building, artifacts and records; to educate and inform the public on lighthouse history; to enhance public awareness of the value this lighthouse and its keepers brought to our nation's development; to make the DeTour Reef Light a premier tourist attraction in Michigan's Upper Peninsula as the best example of a faithfully restored offshore lighthouse in the Nation; to provide the public safe access to the lighthouse; to raise awareness about the importance of volunteers in maintaining and preserving the DeTour Reef Light and the DRLPS for generations to come.
