

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



The Historic Bottomlands Use Agreement for Off Shore Lighthouses



DeTour Reef Light Transferred to DRLPS Harbor Beach Light Transferred to the City of Harbor Beach



After 12 years of dedicated volunteer effort, the DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) received the deed and ceremonial key to the DeTour Reef Light from the Federal Government.

Application for Ownership of the DeTour Reef Light under the terms of the National Historic Lighthouse Preservation Act of 2000 (NHLPA) was submitted to the National Park Service (NPS) on December 31, 2004. The application was extensively prepared by Dave Bardsley, Chuck Feltner, Jeri Baron Feltner, and Clif Haley. The NPS informed DRLPS that it was the best application they had received to date and planned to use it as the "example" for other applications. The National Park Service recommended approval of the application and Gayle Norton, then Secretary of the U.S. Department of Interior, approved the application on August 17, 2005.

However, the insistence by the State of Michigan that DRLPS agree to a bottomlands agreement or lease that gave control of the light-house to the state and in some instances could conflict with the requirements of the NHLPA created years of delay. This delay in the transfer affected not only DeTour Reef Light but also many of the other off-shore lights including Harbor Beach Light.

Finally an agreement was reached in November 2009. Clif Haley, DRLPS legal counsel, Buzz Hoerr, Michigan Lighthouse Alliance President and Harbor Beach Preservation Society President, Dave Bardsley, DRLPS President, and Carol Linteau, DEQ Maritime Culture Advisor, worked to put together a solid agreement.

Both Hoerr and Haley praised Carol Linteau and the staff of the DEQ for their work to craft this agreement. "Carol kept things moving internally and brought a fresh perspective to a very complex issue" said Haley. "She and her colleagues wanted this to work to help save Michigan's offshore lights and she helped us with our historic mission while protecting the interests of the people of Michigan." said Hoerr.

"Together we negotiated an agreement that protects the bottomlands held in trust by Michigan citizens while making it as simple as possible for dedicated preservation groups to continue their critical work of protecting our lighthouses as precious symbols of Michigan's maritime heritage," said Linteau. "

The DRLPS formally obtained ownership of the lighthouse on June 17, 2010. A celebration of the title transfer was held on August 30th at the Eastern Upper Peninsula Fine Arts Center.

The Battle is Won!!

In the past years the DRLPS and the weekend light keepers have won the battle over many unique combatants. First there were the spiders. Thanks to the efforts and skill of Steve Gilbert from End of the Trail Pest Control the spiders are history or at least under control.

In the spring of 2007 a misdirected merganser found her way into the basement through an exhaust pipe. Meade Gable our charter captain extraordinaire gently caught and released her to fly again over the waters of Lake Huron and the St. Mary's River. Brian Nettleton found the entry point (and let a bat out) and covered the pipe with mesh so no other flying creatures could come in to visit.

But the fiercest and longest battle that has been waged has been against the "donations" that the gulls, and other birds leave on the deck. (That's probably why it's been referred to as the Poop Deck.) The DRLPS takes great pride in making the following announcement:

TO ALL LIGHTHOUSE AFICIONADOS BUT MOSTLY TO THOSE WHO HAVE SUFFERED UNDER THE ONSLAUGHTS OF THE SEAGULLS AT THE DETOUR REEF LIGHT, HERE IS THE ANNOUNCEMENT THAT YOU HAVE BEEN WAITING FOR. NO LONGER MUST YOUR DAY ON THE LIGHT BEGIN WITH THE



CRUNCHING UNDER FOOT OF THE LITTER FROM LAST NIGHT'S GALA GULL GATHERING ON THE LIGHTHOUSE PIER DECK. THE DRLPS HAS INSTALLED AN ELECTRONIC BIRD REPELLER TO RESCUE US FROM THE SMELL AND THE MESS!!!

For the first 5 years of the DRLPS Keeper program, the first job of the Volunteer Light Keepers has been to clean up the pier deck in preparation for the lighthouse tours. The power washer got a workout during the summer. It always looked great after a cleaning, but within a short time, the seagulls were back visiting and leaving their marks behind.

DRLPS tried a variety of attacks on the visiting seagulls. Rubber snakes were placed around the light to scare them away. That worked as long as the snakes were moving, which the rubber variety didn't. Next an artificial owl was perched on one of the railings. When a gull was spotted perched on the owl, the DRLPS knew that approach wasn't going to work.

Finally Director Clif Haley found the solution. After testing it out on his dock, he recommended the electronic bird repeller to the Society and it was installed at the beginning of the 2010 keeper and tour season.

This electronic marvel plays not only the calls of raptors delighted to find their next meal, but it also plays the cries of gulls in distress. No gull in their right mind is going to be the first to see if the menu of sounds emanating from the lighthouse is genuine or not. They keep flying and don't stop at the light. But don't just take the DRLPS' word for it. Here the unsolicited testimonials copied from the log book at the DeTour Reef Light:

"Those who have never been here before will NEVER know the miracle of it (the electronic bird repeller). Those who have been here before, REJOICE!!! and never forget our fight against the seagulls. The battle is won!!!"

"In so many ways it has decreased work and increased the quality of the lighthouse stay!"

"Seagulls avoid landing here now - the recording of desperate gulls is unbelievably effective."


"The seagull repeller can be a bit annoying, but, consider the alternative! Every so often a gull will fly by to test out the repeller, but so far the repeller is winning."

From John Covell, volunteer of long standing, "I must say that the electronic bird repeller is a much needed step in the right direction. The model that we have installed at DeTour Reef Light features several different programs equipped to deal with a variety of bird pests: it's all spelled out in the instruction manual. Volume is adjustable, as is the frequency of its alarm or broadcast."

The solution that the DRLPS used is a reasonably priced product called Bird-X. The company describes their product as follows: "Bird-X's electronic solutions consist of sonic, ultrasonic and laser technology, and are used in conjunction with many of their products such as netting, bird spikes, coyote replicas, predator owls and other repellants to create the most comprehensive approach to eliminate pest birds and other pest animals. Bird-X products, used in a wide

variety of markets, prevent the spread of disease and create the cleanest and safest environment possi-

DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society Designated Preserve America Steward by First Lady Michelle Obama

WASHINGTON, D.C.— DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society (DRLPS) was honored recently when Michelle Obama, First Lady of the United States, designated it as one of the nation's newest Preserve America Stewards.

"Preserve America Stewards are committed to preserving America's diverse heritage, and their work demonstrates how individuals who care deeply about serving their country and their communities can make a difference," Mrs. Obama said. "I thank and commend the volunteers of DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society for protecting our nation's historic treasures. You set a wonderful example for our young people, the future stewards of our heritage, while also improving the quality of life and economic vitality of our nation."

David J. Bardsley, President of the DRLPS, received a letter August 2, 2010 and a certificate of designation signed by Mrs. Obama announcing that DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society is now a Preserve America Steward. Designation as a Preserve America Steward provides national recognition for programs that successfully use volunteers to help care for our historic and cultural heritage. Benefits include use of the Preserve America logo on educational and promotional materials and listing in a Webbased directory that showcases DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society volunteer efforts to care for important historic resources for the benefit of present and future generations.

The Preserve America program became an authorized part of the national historic preservation program when President Barack Obama signed the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 on March 30, 2009. The Preserve America program is a federal effort to encourage and support community efforts to preserve and enjoy America's priceless cultural and natural haritage.

Acknowledgment

Foghorn stories

Foghorns can be very deceptive on the water. They can be heard, but it's difficult to know what direction the sound is coming from. Two of the Light's crewmen knew this and they were coming back from a trip to shore in zero visibility with no compass. One of the guys thought that if they watched the wake, it would show them the direction they were traveling. As long as the wake was straight they were heading to the Light. They ended up on the rocks at Frying Pan Island. So much for navigating using the wake.

When the foghorn was active, the crews had about one minute to fall asleep before the next signal, and they joked that they learned to talk with a seven second pause.

Winter shutdown

In the early years, the Light was emptied of all provisions during the winter shutdown. After a pilot crashed and was stranded on Spectacle Reef Light with no food or shelter, Charlie Jones left it unlocked over winter and stored a little food in the pantry. If anyone else became stranded by the ice, he wanted a refuge for them. Eventually the Coast Guard required 2 weeks of C-rations and one tank of propane to be left on the Lighthouses during winter shutdown.

The Light Didn't Fail

More than 100 men served on the DeTour Reef Light from 1931 until it was fully automated in 1974. Charlie Jones was Officer in Charge for 22 years on the Light and retired with 40 years of service as a civilian. Jack Short served on the Light over 10 years. Marvin Kurkierewicz was on the Light three seasons. It was considered a remote assignment by the Coast Guard and the young recruits learned to deal with loneliness and isolation.

Eric Olsen proudly summed up his time on the Light. "It's the good you do. Hundreds of people depended on the Light. The Light didn't fail."





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DeTour Reef Lighthouse Preservation Society

DRLPS is a volunteer nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization established in 1998 to restore and preserve the DeTour Reef Light. Donations are welcomed and are tax-deductible (EIN 38-3387252, MICS 27001).

The Light was automated in 1974. In 1997, the lighthouse was declared surplus property by the U. S. Coast Guard due to sophisticated navigational systems aboard ships, and the Coast Guard's not having the funding to care for the structure in accordance with historic preservation guidelines. In January 1998, local citizens joined together to save the Light.

The lighthouse was built in 1931, and proudly stands guard a mile offshore in northern Lake Huron at the far eastern end of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The structure rises 83 feet above the water and marks a dangerous reef to help guide ship traffic from and to Lake Huron and Lake Superior via the strategic St. Mary's River.

The DRLPS received the 2005 Governor's Award for excellence in historic preservation, and the Superior Award in 2006 from the Historical Society of Michigan. The DeTour Reef Light is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In 2010 the DRLPS was designated a Preserve America Steward by First Lady Michelle Obama.

PURPOSE: the purpose of DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society is to establish, support and promote efforts in the preservation and restoration of the DeTour Reef Light; to achieve the safe keeping of the building, artifacts and records; to educate and inform the public on lighthouse history; to enhance public awareness of the value this lighthouse and its keepers brought to our nation's development; to make the DeTour Reef Light a premier tourist attraction in Michigan's Upper Peninsula as the best example of a faithfully restored offshore lighthouse in the Nation; to provide the public safe access to the lighthouse; to raise awareness about the importance of volunteers in maintaining and preserving the DeTour Reef Light and the DRLPS for generations to come.
