DeTour Reef Light Repaired and More Beautiful Than Ever Seventh Grant from the "Save our Lights" License Plate Program

We have all been working through the long and thorough process of meeting the requirements of the Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program (MLAP) Grant administered by the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO).

The long winter of 2013-2014 delayed the pre-bid site trip for over a month with 40 plus inches of ice in the harbor on the date originally scheduled for the inspection. Once the bidders were able to get to the Light and scope out the work to be done, the process moved smoothly forward. The heavy rains during the summer helped to ensure that the roof was well repaired.

Based on recommendation by both Bryan Lijewski of the State Historic Preservation Office and Ken Czapski of Sanders and Czapski Architects of Marquette, Michigan, venting was installed in the second floor living area to help with circulation within the structure. The approval by SHPO to put a membrane material over the original copper roofing resulted in a significant cost savings and all wall and ceiling areas of the Light were repaired. (The original budget did not include repair of the walls and plaster at the Gallery Level.)

"I enjoyed the trip to the Light very much. It was very informative. I hadn't been to DeTour since I was a child and didn't realize that the light was as close to


DeTour and Drummond Island as it is. In my mind I thought it was a long boat trip.

My memories of Uncle Charlie are very vague as I

I don't remember if Uncle Charlie had any children or not, if he did they must have moved away. I asked my other relatives if they knew of any and none did either.

The \$90,000 grant is the seventh MLAP grant received by the DRLPS since 2001. The DeTour Reef Light Station Water Ingress and Remediation Project was completed at the cost of \$89,782. MLAP will reimburse DRLPS \$59,855 and the DRLPS will pay the remaining \$29,927.

The Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program is funded by proceeds from the sale of the "Save our Lights" license plate.

Introducing the DRLPS 2015 Collector Postcard

The latest DRLPS Collector Postcard is at the printer and I think that you will really like it. As you probably know, this past winter was the longest and coldest that we've seen in the Upper Peninsula in a long time, and the St. Marys River and Lake Huron were pretty much all iced over. In fact, the opening of the shipping season had to be delayed because the freighters couldn't get up and down the river. This picture was taken by DRLPS member, Dr. Richard (Dock) Borth on March 24, 2014. Though the lake wasn't frozen solid right up to the Light, the water immediately surrounding it was filled with large ice shards, with solid ice leading up to it. You can see in the picture how the ice built up on the sides of the crib.

Dock said "This picture was taken on March 24, 2014. I drove out Lighthouse Point Road in DeTour Village the shore to the point. I carried my camera on my chest and I carried my tripod in my hands. Where the point turns, I set up my tripod and took pictures. This is the one I chose. The picture was taken with a Nikon D800 E

and a 600mm Lens. It took about 4 hours to complete." He checked on the chart and noted that he was still 0.6 nautical miles from the Light.



DeTour Reef Lighthouse Preservation Society

DRLPS is a volunteer nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization established in 1998 to restore and preserve the DeTour Reef Light. Donations are welcomed and are tax-deductible (EIN 38-3387252, MICS 27001).

The Light was automated in 1974. In 1997, the lighthouse was declared surplus property by the U. S. Coast Guard due to sophisticated navigational systems aboard ships, and the Coast Guard's not having the funding to care for the structure in accordance with historic preservation guidelines. In January 1998, local citizens joined together to save the Light.

The lighthouse was built in 1931, and proudly stands guard a mile offshore in northern Lake Huron at the far eastern end of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The structure rises 83 feet above the water and marks a dangerous reef to help guide ship traffic from and to Lake Huron and Lake Superior via the strategic St. Mary's River.

The DRLPS received the 2005 Governor's Award for excellence in historic preservation, and the Superior Award in 2006 from the Historical Society of Michigan. The DeTour Reef Light is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In 2010 the DRLPS was designated a Preserve America Steward by First Lady Michelle Obama.

PURPOSE: the purpose of DeTour Reef Light Preservation Society is to establish, support and promote efforts in the preservation and restoration of the DeTour Reef Light; to achieve the safe keeping of the building, artifacts and records; to educate and inform the public on lighthouse history; to enhance public awareness of the value this lighthouse and its keepers brought to our nation's development; to make the DeTour Reef Light a premier tourist attraction in Michigan's Upper Peninsula as the best example of a faithfully restored offshore lighthouse in the Nation; to provide the public safe access to the lighthouse; to raise awareness about the importance of volunteers in maintaining and preserving the DeTour Reef Light and the DRLPS for generations to come.
